

Includes coverage of managerial control methods, cost accounting, cost-volume-profit relationships, variable costing, budgeting, and other related topics. This course has the option of a letter grade or pass/no pass. ADVISORY: Accounting 20. Microsoft Excel or other computer spreadsheet knowledge.

Health and fingerprint clearance required prior to clinical placement. Uniform, shoes, watch, and stethoscope required. Clinical in Morgan Hill or Hollister, as assigned.



AMT 120 Aviation Powerplant Technology

Transferable: CSU

This course is part of the curriculum required by the Federal Aviation Administration to obtain certification as an aircraft powerplant maintenance technician. This certificate allows the rated technician to perform maintenance, preventive maintenance repairs and alterations to USA FAA certificated aircraft powerplants. CHEM 30A Elementary Chemistry

The first semester chemistry course designed for majors preparing to take Chemistry 1A, nursing and allied health students, as well as general education.

Chem 30A is a prerequisite for Chem 30B (taught in the spring semester)

CHEM 30A satisfies the Physical Science requirement for transfer to both the California State University and the University of California systems. It *may* satisfy Science major prerequisites. See a counselor.

Transferable: CSU

Students will study historical trends in children's literature and participate in practical experiences and activities that use a wide range of techniques and materials for advancing language comprehension and usage. This course has the option of a letter grade or pass/no pass. ADVISORY: Eligible for English 250 and English 260.

CD 23 Independent Study

This course has the option of a letter grade or pass/no pass. REQUIRED: The study outline prepared by the student and the instructor must be approved by the department and the dean.

CD 35 Establishing Positive Behavior in the Classroom

Transferable: CSU

Introduces the student to realistic and effective strategies for guiding all young children's behavior. This course demonstrates best practices for establishing and maintaining age and developmentally- appropriate productive behaviors among all children in a classroom setting. Course topics include environmental, developmental and special needs sources of maladaptive and challenging behaviors, guidelines for selecting and implementing strategies for positive behavior change for all children, and developing healthy communication strategies with families, program staff and children. ADVISORY: Eligible for English 1A.

CD 190 Occupational Work Experience/Child Development

Transferable: CSU

College credit for learning experience obtained on the job in accordance with a training plan developed cooperatively between the employer, college and student. 75 hours per semester per unit or 60 hours per semester for unpaid experience. This is a pass/no pass course. May be taken for a maximum of 16 work experience units. REQUIRED: Declared vocational major. Concurrent enrollment in seven or more units (including CWE units, except for summer school. For summer school, enrollment in one other class is required). Minimum 2.00 G.P.A.

For all four following classes: In order to obtain Field Work Credit for the Occupational Work Experience placement, students must enroll in CD30A or 30B.

Increasing the awareness and understanding of diversity, the perception process, culture, verbal and non-verbal communication and the obstacles that prevent one from becoming a competent intercultural communicator will be examined.
